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What is Version Control Software?

- Keeps track of all changes made to a set of files
- Automates the storing, retrieval, logging, identification, and merging of revisions









Version Control is a Good Thing

- Creates historical record of changes
- Can roll back to earlier versions of a file





Version Control is a Good Thing (part II)

- Allows multiple developers to work on the same code base (project) simultaneously
 - Client-server architecture where server houses current project and clients can check it out, work locally, and then submit changes back to server
- Branching, merging, tagging, etc.





Multiple-User Demo

- Keeps programmers working on current version of files
- Minimizes chance of duplicating work
- When conflicts do arise, CVS alerts users
